CITY OF CAYCE Regular Council Meeting June 3, 2014

The June Regular Council Meeting was held this evening at 6:00 p.m. in Council Chambers. Those present included Mayor Elise Partin, Council Members Tara Almond, Eva Corley, Tim James, and James Jenkins, City Manager Rebecca Vance, Assistant City Manager Shaun Greenwood and Municipal Clerk Mendy Corder. Municipal Treasurer Garry Huddle, Director of Utilities, Blake Bridwell, and Chief Charles McNair were also in attendance. Mayor Partin asked if members of the press and the public were duly notified of the Council Meeting in accordance with the FOIA. Ms. Corder confirmed they were notified.

Call to Order

Mayor Partin called the meeting to order. Council Member Jenkins gave the invocation. Mayor Partin led the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Approval of Minutes

Council Member Almond made a motion to approve the minutes of the May 6, 2014 Regular Meeting and the May 21, 2014 Special Meeting as submitted. Council Member Jenkins seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

Presentations and Proclamations

A. Presentation of Whole Sole Award

Mayor Partin presented the Whole Sole Award to Ms. Melissa Denny, Ms. Angie Roof and Ms. Jane Smoak. Mayor Partin thanked them for their hard work in coordinating a fundraiser and raising close to \$10,000 for a fellow employee's wife who was diagnosed with cancer.

B. Presentation by Mr. Lowe Sharpe re Tree City USA

Mr. Lowe Sharpe, the Urban Coordinator, with the South Carolina Forestry Commission explained that the City of Cayce has been designated a 2013 Tree City USA city. He thanked Mayor and Council for their commitment to effective urban forest management. He explained that the City achieved the status by meeting the program's four requirements: having a tree board or department, having a tree-care ordinance, an annual community forestry budget of at least \$2 per capita and an Arbor Day

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observance and proclamation. Mayor Partin and Council had their picture taken with Mr. Sharpe holding the Tree City USA banner.

C. Approval of Proclamation – Communications Month and Say Something Nice Day

Council considered for approval a Proclamation designating May as Communications Month and June 1st as Say Something Nice Day. Council Member Jenkins made a motion to approve the Proclamation as presented. Council Member James seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote. Mayor Partin thanked staff for all their hard work and said it was her privilege to work with them and Council.

Mayor Partin stated that Council would not be taking action on agenda items IV.C. and IV.D since there would be a vote later in the meeting to postpone both rezonings. She explained that the public could still comment on either item.

Public Comment Regarding Items on the Agenda

Mr. Matt Carroll, 1118 Blake Drive, Item IV.C. – Mr. Carroll stated that he lives on the street adjacent to the property that is under consideration for rezoning. He stated he and his neighbors are in favor of the development but were concerned about people parking on their street and hoped there was a plan in place to enforce parking and traffic issues. Mr. Carroll stated he had heard there was going to be a gate installed at the back of the property for entrance to the Riverwalk Park and there was concern people may park on Blake Drive to access the park through the gate.

Mr. Russell Cann, 1120 Blake Drive, Item IV.C. – Mr. Cann thanked Mayor and Council for their service and stated that the City's staff was awesome. He stated that he wanted to make sure that stormwater is addressed in the plans for the new development. He explained that all the neighbors on Blake Drive support the new development and think it will be a great improvement to the area. Mr. Cann stated that the neighbors want to make sure that the neighborhood stays a single home community.

Mr. Derek Nattier, 1111 Blake Drive, Item IV.C. – Mr. Nattier stated he thinks development in Cayce is fantastic and he loves to see the City grow but he wants to make sure it is done the right way. He stated he was concerned that the development could turn into college student housing.

Mr. Russell Long, 900 K Avenue, Item IV.F. – Mr. Long stated that he felt the hospitality tax would penalize Cayce's residents and small business owners. He stated it might be time to look at cutting services rather than raising taxes or fees. He

explained that people on fixed incomes would appreciate any consideration Council could give them.

Ms. Carol Bowles, 1402 Prentiss Street, Item IV.F. – Ms. Bowles asked a question concerning the Budget Facts sheet that was distributed to all the City's residents. She thought the pie chart showed that only 31.4% of property taxes were collected. Mayor Partin explained that it actually illustrated that property taxes only make up 31.4% of the City's revenue.

Mr. Jamie Campbell, 1131 M Avenue, Item IV.F. – Mr. Campbell explained that he had concerns about the budget process. He felt there were a number of ideas for cuts that weren't considered, he stated only tax increases were considered. He stated he felt that some of the matching monies for grants should be reconsidered since beautification projects were nice but not necessary. Mr. Campbell stated he was totally against the hospitality tax and felt that it currently was not the time to ask for it.

Ordinances and Other

 A. Approval of Ordinance Amending Chapter 28 ("Offenses and Miscellaneous Provisions") of the City Code to Add a New Section 28-59 ("Damaging and Looting Archaeological/Historical Sites") – First Reading

Council Member James made a motion to approve an Ordinance amending Chapter 28 of the City of Cayce Code of Ordinances. Council Member Almond seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote. Mayor Partin explained that the ordinance was created to preserve archaeological pieces in the 12,000 Year History Park. Ms. Vance stated the ordinance is part of the Memorandum of Understanding with the National Park Service. She stated they had asked the City to adopt an ordinance to protect and preserve the archaeological and historical sites within the City. This ordinance gives Cayce law enforcement tools for prosecuting individuals who remove artifacts from these sites and/or damage these sites.

B. Approval of Intergovernmental Agreement with Lexington County Concerning implementation of Stormwater Management Program

Mr. Greenwood stated as part of the City of Cayce's participation in the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES), the City, Lexington County and other municipalities in the watershed participate in a Stormwater Consortium. The NPDES requires the City to maintain a Stormwater Management Program. The agreement outlines the responsibilities of the City of Cayce and Lexington County as it relates to the City's SWMP. A new NPDES permit was placed into effect as of January 1, 2014. As a result, a new agreement is required between the City of Cayce and Lexington County. Council Member Almond made a motion to approve the Intergovernmental

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Agreement with Lexington County and authorize the Mayor and City Manager to sign the agreement. Council Member Corley seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

Mayor Partin explained that the land owners had requested that agenda items IV.C. and IV.D. be postponed until they can get some further data needed to staff. Council Member Almond made a motion to postpone Item IV. C. and Item IV. D. Council Member James seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

E. Approval of Ordinance Amending Zoning Map and Rezoning property located at Tax Map Number 005749-13-002 (003)(005) from RG-2 (General Residential, High Rise) to M-1 (Light Industrial) – Second Reading

Council Member Almond made a motion to approve the ordinance on second reading amending the zoning map and rezoning the property from RG-2 to M-1. Council Member Corley seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

F. Approval of Ordinance Providing for a Local Hospitality Tax on the Sales of Prepared Meals and Beverages in Establishments – First Reading

Council Member Almond made a motion to approve the ordinance providing for a local hospitality tax. Council Member James and Council Member Jenkins seconded the motion at the same time. Ms. Vance explained that the hospitality tax is a 2% tax on prepared food and beverages. She stated the 2% tax is added to the bill at a restaurant and is not subtracted from the restaurant's revenues. She explained it is not an extra tax on the restaurant. She stated that if the capital penny passes in Lexington County then the City will be required to reduce its 2% hospitality tax to 1%.

Ms. Vance explained that Lexington School District Two will have a bond referendum on the November ballot. She stated there is currently a penny sales tax that pays for school debt and the referendum won't add another penny. It will just increase the school debt.

Ms. Vance explained that the hospitality tax is purely a use tax; you have to purchase prepared foods or beverages to pay the tax. The tax can only be two pennies and can only be used for tourism related facilities and operation and maintenance. She stated half of the money can be spent on operation and maintenance of the Cayce Historical Museum and the Cayce Riverwalk Park. Ms. Vance explained that the first phase of the Riverwalk is twelve years old and is at the point that it needs repairs. There is not money in the General Fund budget to make these repairs and there are not any grants for repairs; there are only grants available for new sections.

Ms. Vance explained that the other half of the hospitality tax money can be used on brick and mortar capital facilities. For example, building a new Museum or a new trail. The money can also be used for the 12,000 Year History Park or used to match grants on beautification projects.

Mayor Partin stated she was not able to attend the May 21, 2014 Special Council Meeting due to an illness but she was told that Mr. Leo Redmond, the Director of the Cayce Museum, spoke at the meeting in support of the Hospitality Tax. There was a large amount of people in the audience in support of it as well. Mr. Redmond also gave Mayor and Council a list of approximately fifty people who support the hospitality tax. Mayor Partin stated one reason Council looked at the hospitality tax as an option to balance the budget is because they had heard from a lot of people in favor of it.

Ms. Vance stated that one of the options given to Council to balance the budget was to go to a part-time Museum or discontinue it altogether. She explained one of the problems the City has is a lack of operation and maintenance revenue. The City's property taxes and business license fees have declined and the hospitality tax is another source of revenue that can take pressure off the General Fund. It would free up money to be spent on core services such as police and fire.

Council Member James stated in all his time in Cayce he had never seen so many people attend a Council Meeting in support of something. He explained that at a time when Council was trying to figure out the best way to balance the budget it was a pleasant surprise to have so many people present the hospitality tax as an option. He stated he has received many phone calls from residents in support of the hospitality tax. Council Member James stated many people visit the City now to enjoy the Riverwalk and many college students live in the City so let them share the expenses of the great things going on in the City.

Mayor Partin stated a majority of the people who visit the City's restaurants during lunch hours are not residents of the City. She explained that the Interstate 77 interchange will also be a large site where the source of the hospitality tax will come from. Council Member James stated over six million people have visited the Riverwalk and that is a lot of people visiting the City of Cayce. Mayor Partin called the question and the motion passed unanimously by roll call vote.

G. Approval of Ordinance to Adopt an Annual Budget for the City of Cayce for FY14/15 – First Reading

Ms. Vance explained that the budget was balanced with option three. She stated option three includes all the other cuts that were made along with not hiring a Director for Planning and Department, not taking positions from part time to full time and only purchasing \$107,000 in equipment of the \$1.7 million that was requested and is

needed. She explained that just that morning she had to make the hard decision to spend \$5,000 in repairs on a truck in the Fire Department that is only worth \$1,500 but there are not any funds to purchase new capital items. Ms. Vance stated the City did not make any capital purchases last year or this year so unfortunately the City is going to get back to the point where it is spending money on vehicles that should be replaced and that is not a good use of taxpayers' money.

Ms. Vance stated that Council wanted to keep their promise to add twelve new firefighters in four years so to balance this year's budget it was decided to hire three new firefighters for half of a year instead of a full year. She stated the residential sanitation fees are going to increase from the originally budgeted amount of \$7.50 to \$9.00 per month. This is part of the five year plan to make the department self sustaining like Sanitation Department's are in other communities.

Ms. Vance stated it was also decided to change the Police Officers in the City Parks to Park Rangers to save money on equipment and retirement costs. She explained that nine months of hospitality tax revenue is included in the budget so the City would start collecting it in October. Council Member Almond made a motion to approve the budget on first reading. Council Member Corley seconded the motion. Council Member James stated if any unexpected funds become available then staff needs to look at decreasing the unanticipated increase in sanitation rates and lower the fees to \$7.50 a month instead of \$9 a month. Mayor Partin explained that the World Wide Recycling fire cost the City a million dollars which didn't help the budget. Mayor Partin called the question and the motion passed unanimously by roll call vote.

City Manager's Report

Ms. Vance stated the City received a JAG Grant that will be used to purchase all the capital equipment that was requested in the Court's budget and cut. A new printer, computer, recording equipment and metal detector will be purchased. She reminded everyone that the City's Centennial Celebration is September 5 – 7, 2014. There will be a free concert at the Brickworks property, a family friendly celebration at Granby Gardens Park and a historic day where a twenty five year old time capsule will be unburied and a new one buried.

Ms. Vance stated that Phase IV of the Riverwalk was re-bid since all the bids came in so high. She explained that staff cleared the area to save money. The Lexington Avenue CDBG project is about to come to completion. She stated that staff had software training for the new software recently. The new software will be much more effective and efficient and there will be less duplication. She stated implementation for the software is July 1, 2014.

Committee Matters

A. Approval to Enter the Following Approved Committee Minutes into the City's Official Record

Council Member Corley made a motion to approve entering the following Committee minutes into the City's official record:

Museum Commission – April 1, 2014 Cayce Events Committee – April 17, 2014 Planning Commission – April 21, 2014 Museum Commission – April 30, 2014

Council Member Almond seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

B. Appointments and Reappointments

Beautification Foundation - Two (2) Positions

Mr. Butch Kelly and Mr. Ross Shealy's terms expired in May. They would both like to serve again and the Foundation has recommended them for reappointment. Council Member Jenkins made a motion to reappoint both members. Council Member James seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

Events Committee - One (1) Position

Ms. Frankie Newman's term expired in June. She would like to serve again and the Committee has recommended her for reappointment. Council Member James made a motion to reappoint Ms. Newman. Council Member Jenkins seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

Public Safety Foundation – One (1) Position

Mr. Murray Fant's term expired in May and he would like to serve again. Council Member Almond made a motion to reappoint Mr. Fant. Council Member James seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

Mayor Partin reminded the audience that the City does have open positions on the Accommodations Tax Committee, Consolidated Board of Appeals and the Public Safety Foundation. She asked them to see Ms. Corder if they were interested in serving.

C. Request by Events Committee to Amend By-Laws

Ms. Corder explained that Council approval was needed for the Cayce Events Committee to amend their By-Laws to reflect the meeting time change from 5:30pm to 5:45pm and to increase the number of members from nine to eleven. She explained that the Committee is a very active committee that is instrumental in putting on the Congaree Bluegrass Festival, Christmas in Cayce and the Caroling Along the Riverwalk event every year. The events the Committee put on are physically demanding and it would be beneficial to have more members to assist with the various events. Council Member Jenkins made a motion to approve the amendments to the By-Laws. Council Member James seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

Executive Session

Council Member Jenkins made a motion to move into Executive Session to discuss the matters above. Council Member Almond seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

After the Executive Session was concluded, Council Member Almond made a motion to reconvene the Regular meeting. Council Member Corley seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote. Mayor Partin announced that no vote was taken in Executive Session other than to adjourn and resume the Regular meeting.

Council Member James made a motion to authorize the City Manager to negotiate as discussed in reference to the new sewer line that was installed and deeded back to the City. Council Member Almond seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

There being no further business, Council Member James made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Council Member Jenkins seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote. The meeting adjourned at 7:26 p.m.

CITY OF CAYCE Public Hearings and Special Council Meeting June 18, 2014

A Public Hearing was held at 5:00 p.m. in Council Chambers to obtain public comment on the proposed local hospitality tax on the sales of prepared meals and beverages in establishments. Those present included Mayor Elise Partin, Council Members Tara Almond, Eva Corley, Tim James, and James Jenkins, City Manager Rebecca Vance, Assistant City Manager Shaun Greenwood, Mendy Corder, Municipal Clerk and Garry Huddle, Municipal Treasurer. Mayor Partin asked if members of the press and the public were duly notified of the Public Hearing in accordance with the FOIA. Ms. Corder confirmed they were notified.

Opening Statement

Mayor Partin explained that the tax would be a 2% sales tax on prepared foods in the City. She stated the City's property taxes are currently lower than they were in 2010 and Council is very proud of that. She stated Council feels that the hospitality tax is an option that enables the City to continue to offer great quality services to its citizens with help from people who live outside the City.

Ms. Vance explained that the hospitality tax is purely a use tax; you have to purchase prepared foods or beverages to pay the tax. She explained that it was not a tax on the restaurants; the restaurants will collect the tax for the City. She stated staff is estimating that the City will collect approximately \$644,000 yearly. The tax can only be two pennies and the money can only be used for tourism related facilities and operation and maintenance of those facilities. She stated half of the money can be spent on operation and maintenance of the Cayce Historical Museum and the Cayce Riverwalk Park. She explained what the money can be spent on centers around developing tourism with the hope that more people will visit the City and spend money in the local restaurants and therefore more money is collected to be spent on bringing more tourists to the City.

Ms. Vance explained that the other half of the hospitality tax money can be used on brick and mortar capital facilities. For example, building a new Museum or a new park trail. She explained that the first phase of the Riverwalk is twelve years old and is at the point that it needs repairs. She stated upkeep of the Riverwalk and the Museum are currently paid for with money out of the General Fund. The hospitality tax would be another option to fund both the Riverwalk and the Museum and free up money in the General Fund to be used on core services. The money can also be used for the 12,000 Year History Park or used to match grants on Beautification projects. Examples of beautification projects are streetscaping and signage for the City.

Public Testimony

Mr. Leo Redmond, 1601 Axtell Drive - Mr. Redmond stated that he was in favor of the hospitality tax since the Museum could be funded with it. He explained that the Museum could one day have to become a part time Museum or even close altogether if there is not money in the General Fund to fund it. He stated initially many of the people that he spoke to were against the hospitality tax, but once he explained that the revenues from the tax would fund the Cayce Historical Museum they were in favor of it. Mr. Redmond stated he supports Council and all the people in the assembly support them as well with the hard decision to implement a hospitality tax. He stated that he feels the hospitality tax option is the best option for the City

Mr. Joe Long, 737 Naples Avenue – Mr. Long stated he does support the hospitality tax but does not support spending the money on projects that are not smart or strategic to the promotion of growth and development for the City. He stated that last Fall the hospitality tax was promoted as a way to improve the City's beautification and help attract new businesses but now is being promoted as a way to save the Museum. Mr. Long questioned whether the City's future should be so history oriented. He suggested using the money to make a film on the City's history or create an interactive website. He stated he recently learned that the Museum had 7,799 visitors in 2013. He questioned the attendance data and its impact on the City for attracting significant numbers of tourists to the City. He stated he questions spending \$150,000 every year on the Museum. He suggested spending that money on a marketing campaign for the City.

Mr. John Banks, 2032 Fairlawn Circle – Mr. Banks stated he was in favor of the hospitality tax. He stated the City needs beautification projects since the way the City looks says a lot about what kind of City it is and attracts new people to the City. As more people move into the City they will spend their money in the City's restaurants and businesses and create more jobs in the City. Mr. Banks explained that he is the Director of Tourism for the West Metro Visitors Center. He stated that at this time the City only has a few attractions that he can promote for tourism. He explained that the 12,000 Year History Park could be an incredible avenue to bring people to the City and make Cayce and the 12,000 Year History Park a destination. He stated that every day over 500 people an hour visit the Riverwalk. He stated in order to keep the Riverwalk safe and comfortable for people to visit it money has to be spent to maintain it.

Mr. Banks stated he is a stakeholder in the Columbia Speedway. He explained that many national events are held there every year but many more could be held there if hospitality tax funds were available. He explained that when people contact him regarding renting the Speedway for their event their first question is whether the City of

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Cayce has hospitality tax funds available to assist with the event. He stated 9,000 people from thirteen states attended the Tartan Day South event this year which proves people will come to Cayce if we give them things to do.

Close Hearing

Mayor Partin asked if anyone else in the assembly would like to speak. No other public comment was received; Mayor Partin closed the public hearing.

A Public Hearing was held at 5:30 p.m. in Council Chambers to obtain public comment on the annual budget for the City of Cayce for FY14-15. Those present included Mayor Elise Partin, Council Members Tara Almond, Eva Corley, Tim James, and James Jenkins, City Manager Rebecca Vance, Assistant City Manager Shaun Greenwood, Mendy Corder, Municipal Clerk and Garry Huddle, Municipal Treasurer. Mayor Partin asked if members of the press and the public were duly notified of the Public Hearing in accordance with the FOIA. Ms. Corder confirmed they were notified.

Opening Statement

Mayor Partin stated that Council is proud of the fact that they run a very tight budget. She stated there is not any fluff in the budget and on occasion Council has to make very tough decisions. Ms. Vance explained that she, Mr. Greenwood and Mr. Huddle meet with each department head and literally go through each department's budget line by line comparing it to the audit and the actual numbers to decide what to keep and what to cut. The department heads are also given the opportunity to present their budget to Council and answer any questions they may have. Ms. Vance explained that this year's budget process was particularly hard since there were unexpected increases in expenditures and decreases in revenues.

Ms. Vance stated the budget was balanced at \$10,127,179. She explained \$1.7 million in capital equipment was requested but only \$107,000 is in the budget. Three additional firefighters will be hired in January rather than in July but they will have to be budgeted for a full year next year. The budget also includes an increase in the residential sanitation fee to nine dollars a month. She stated there is a five year plan in place to increase the fee so that residential sanitation service will eventually be self sustaining. The budget also includes \$251,000 which is approximately nine months of the hospitality tax.

Public Testimony

No one from the public in attendance offered any public testimony or comment.

Close Hearing

Mayor Partin closed the public hearing noting that no public comment was received.

The Special Council Meeting immediately followed the Public Hearing at 5:45 p.m. in Council Chambers. Those present included Mayor Elise Partin, Council Members Tara Almond, Eva Corley, Tim James, and James Jenkins, City Manager Rebecca Vance, Assistant City Manager Shaun Greenwood, Municipal Clerk Mendy Corder and Garry Huddle, Municipal Treasurer and Public Safety Director Charles McNair were also in attendance. Mayor Partin asked if members of the press and the public were duly notified of the Council Meeting in accordance with the FOIA. Ms. Corder confirmed they were notified.

Mayor Partin called the meeting to order. Mayor Partin asked Council Member Jenkins to include Andrew Evans, a 2006 Brookland-Cayce High School graduate that passed away, in the prayer. Council Member Jenkins gave the invocation and Mayor Partin lead the assembly in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

Other

A. Approval of a Resolution Authorizing an Application to the South Carolina Water Quality Revolving Fund Authority for a Loan from the Drinking Water Revolving Loan Fund

Ms. Vance stated that the SRF loan is for the repair of the Hwy. 321 line that had a break in it last year and caused the entire City to be without water for sixteen hours. She explained part of the application process requires that a Resolution be passed by Council. She explained that in the Resolution it says up to \$3.5 million but staff is in hopes it will not exceed \$3.2 million. She reminded Council that the bond payment and the 15% debt coverage are already in the Utility Budget. Ms. Vance stated the line is the main trunk line that serves everyone's water and sewer service. She stated it is going to be replaced and upsized in places so the City can provide good water service for the next thirty years. Council Member James made a motion to approve the Resolution authorizing the application. Council Member Almond seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

B. Approval of Ordinance Amending Chapter 28 ("Offenses and Miscellaneous Provisions") of the City Code to Add a New Section 28-59 ("Damaging and Looting Archaeological/Historical Sites") – Second Reading

Council Member Jenkins made a motion to approve the Ordinance amending Chapter 28 of the City Code to add a section prohibiting damaging and/or looting an archaeological or historic site in the City. Council Member James seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

C. Approval of Ordinance Amending Zoning Map and Rezoning property located at Tax Map Number 005724-06-005 from M-2 to M-1 – First Reading

Mr. Greenwood explained that the property is the Town and Country Shopping Center and is currently zoned as M-2 (Heavy Industrial). He stated staff believes this zoning is erroneous and does not support current and historical uses of the property. The various uses of the subject property are legal non-conformities because, in the past, units have been occupied by eating establishments, beauty salons, and thrift stores. He stated if a legal non-conforming use were to sit vacant for over 6 months, it would lose the non-conformity status and could not be used for that purpose.

Mr. Greenwood explained that two zoning permits have been recently denied because of this. Due to the types of uses that have occupied units at the subject property, the applicant is requesting an M-1 zoning designation. Mr. Greenwood stated the requested zoning is in compliance with the Comprehensive Plan. Council Member Almond made a motion to approve the Ordinance amending the zoning map and rezoning the property from M-2 to M-1. Council Member Corley seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

D. Approval of Ordinance Amending Zoning Map and Rezoning property located at Tax Map Number R11000-01-06 (Portion) from D-1 to M-1 - First Reading

Mr. Greenwood stated that the property is located at the corner of S. Beltline Boulevard and Bluff Road in Richland County. He explained there are two different requests for this property. He stated the developer of the property wants to put a billboard style sign on the property that is closer to the interstate. The property consists of 149 or more acres and the applicant wishes to rezone a portion, 8.23 acres, of the property to M-1 (Light Industrial). The property is currently zoned as D-1. Mr. Greenwood explained that the D-1 zoning classification is used as an agricultural holding zone and requires rezoning to an appropriate zoning classification before it may be developed. The M-1 zoning classification accommodates wholesaling, light manufacturing, and business park settings.

Mr. Greenwood stated the Planning Commission considered the request for rezoning at its regular meeting on June 16, 2014. The re-zoning request was opened for

public hearing and the Head Master of Heathwood Hall addressed the Planning Commission. He stated the Head Master did not speak in favor or against the rezoning but wanted to make sure the Planning Commission took into account concerns regarding traffic.

Mr. Greenwood stated the developer was at the meeting and the developer explained that he was working with SC DOT regarding the roads. He stated the site plan design is not complete yet and that it will ultimately determine if a traffic impact study has to be done. The developer did say that they are designing the site to allow for safe travel by adding entrances and exits as far from the intersection as possible. They are also designing it so there will be free flow of traffic behind the building as well. Mr. Greenwood stated the developer is trying to design the property so it will be as traffic friendly as possible.

Mayor Partin asked if Council will know about the site plan and SC DOT's findings before the second reading of the Ordinance. Mr. Greenwood stated that technically the developer does not have to have a site plan when requesting rezoning but stated staff will get that information to Council if the developer submits it to staff. Council Member Jenkins voiced concern over Council not seeing the site plan before passing the rezoning request. Council Member James voiced concern as well and stated he would like to be educated more on the process before second reading.

Ms. Vance explained that the site plans are submitted to the Planning Commission or staff; they do not come before Council. She stated that Council recently approved new Land Development Regulations and these regulations control what is on the site, how the site is configured, lot coverage, etc. Ms. Vance stated staff would be happy to go over the Land Development Regulations with Council so they will be comfortable with the regulations and know that the requirements will create a site plan that Council would be pleased with. Mr. Greenwood stated he would meet with Council Member James and Council Member Jenkins so they can discuss the issue further. Council Member James made a motion to approve the Ordinance on first reading. Council Member Jenkins seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

E. Approval of Ordinance Amending Zoning Map and Rezoning property located at Tax Map Number R11100-01-10 (Portion) from D-1 to C-4 – First Reading

Mr. Greenwood stated the property is currently zoned as D-1. He explained the D-1 zoning classification is used as an agricultural holding zone and requires rezoning to an appropriate zoning classification before it may be developed. The property identified by TMS# R11100-01-10 consists of 221 or more acres and the applicant

wishes to rezone a portion, 26.65 acres, of the property to C-4 (Highway Commercial). The C-4 zoning classification accommodates commercial development which caters to the needs of the traveling public and highway dependent uses. The developer plans on building a travel center on the property. Council Member James made a motion to approve the rezoning. Council Member Corley seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

F. Approval of Ordinance Providing for a Local Hospitality Tax on the Sales of Prepared Meals and Beverages in Establishments – Second Reading

Council Member Almond made a motion to approve the Ordinance providing for a local 2% hospitality tax. Council Member Corley seconded the motion. Mayor Partin stated she spoke to a local restaurant owner earlier that day and he reminded her that when a zip code study was done as part of the Charette the study showed that 75% of his business at lunch was from outside the City. Mayor Partin called the question and the motion was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

G. Approval of Ordinance to Adopt and Annual Budget for the City of Cayce for FY14/15 – Second Reading

Council Member James made a motion to approve the FY14/15 budget. Council Member Almond seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

Executive Session

A. Receipt of legal advice relating to a claim and potential claim by the City and other matters covered by the attorney-client privilege

Ms. Vance stated the City Attorney's flight was delayed and he would not be able to attend the meeting so there would not be an executive session. Council Member James asked if a decision had been reached regarding the July 1, 2014 Council Meeting date. Ms. Vance stated two Council Meetings are required in July since there will need to be two readings regarding the Sunday Alcohol Sales before it can be put on the ballot. The Mayor asked Ms. Vance and Council Member James to meet and discuss what items will be on the July 1, 2014 meeting agenda to see if Council Member James is comfortable missing that meeting.

ISSUE

Council approval is needed for the first reading of an Ordinance to allow off premise Sunday alcohol sales in grocery stores and gas stations.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

The City has received inquiries from citizens, grocery store and gas station owners about the permissibility of Sunday alcohol sales within the City. Currently, there is no City Ordinance that allows for off premise Sunday sales. Staff researched the Ordinances of other cities that allow off premise sales and created an Ordinance that will best fit the City of Cayce. The Ordinance will allow the off premise Sunday Sales question to be placed on this November's election ballot. If passed, grocery store and gas station owners within the City of Cayce will be eligible to go to the Department of Revenue and purchase a special permit allowing for Sunday sales. Staff feels the passing of this ordinance will recruit new business and increase business in Cayce's current grocery stores and gas stations.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that Council approve First Reading of an Ordinance to allow off premise Sunday alcohol sales.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Cayce, in Council, duly assembled, that:

- 1, The Council hereby calls for a referendum as provided for in South Carolina Code Ann. § 61-6-2010 and directs that the following question be placed on the ballot on the November 4, 2014, general election to be voted on by all qualified voters: "Shall the Department of Revenue be authorized to issue temporary permits in this municipality for a period not to exceed twenty-four hours to allow the sale of beer and wine at permitted off-premises locations without regard to the days or hours of sales?"
- 2. The Council requests that the Lexington County Registration and Election Commission and the Richland County Registration and Election Commission conduct the referendum and place the above requested question on the next general election ballot for the City of Cayce on Tuesday, November 4, 2014, and that the Commissions conduct the referendum in the manner provided for by law for such general election.

ISSUE

The Department of Juvenile Justice has requested that the City of Cayce execute a new/revised memorandum of agreement for FY2014-2015 for juvenile detention services.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

Again this year the DJJ has submitted a Memorandum of Agreement for FY2014-2015. This agreement maintains the per diem rate of \$50.00 as last year. The City Attorney recommends making modifications to the agreement, deleting the disclaimer of financial responsibility by DJJ for medical costs and inserting the transport clause that has been included in past agreements. The proposed paragraphs again states that "DJJ shall not be financially responsible for the cost of medical care provided to a juvenile detained in its juvenile detention center for any injury, illness, condition, or medical need that pre-existed the juvenile's admission to its Detention Center".

On page two, the paragraph stating "local law enforcement agency having jurisdiction where the offense was committed shall be responsible for transporting all juveniles to and from DJJ's Juvenile Detention Center has been replaced by an alternate paragraph as recommended by the City Attorney stating "DJJ shall be responsible for transporting juveniles to and from its Juvenile Detention Center in Columbia and any staff secure or community residence placement to which is assigns a juvenile detainee." This is the same language included initially in the FY2003-2004 agreement and carried forward each year.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that Council approve the revised Memorandum of Agreement with the Department of Juvenile Justice, and that the agreement contains a strikethrough which deletes the paragraph in question on medical expense and that the paragraph on transportation issues also be changed as per the City Attorney's recommendation. It is also recommended that the City Manager be authorized to execute the agreement.

Enclosed please find a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) for the provision of secure detention services with the Department of Juvenile Justice's (DJJ) Detention Center for fiscal year 2014 - 2015. All substantive terms and conditions contained in this agreement are the same as those contained in last year's agreement. The per diem rate is \$50.00 per day for any juvenile housed at our detention facility.

This agreement will not obligate you in any way unless your agency/department chooses to, or is ordered by a court to, detain a juvenile awaiting trial or sentencing. Should you anticipate the need to use our facility anytime during the 2014 - 2015 fiscal year, please sign the enclosed contract within 30 days of receipt and return to: Department of Juvenile Justice, Attention: Sherri C. Hill Facility Administrator, Juvenile Detention Center, 1725 Shivers Road, Columbia, South Carolina 29210. This agreement will not be accepted by the department if altered or amended in any way.

In addition, in lieu of detaining juveniles in DJJ's secure detention center, the Department has contracted with a number of therapeutic foster care providers located in your area. This program identifies responsible adults/ foster parents who will accept into their homes juveniles charged with non-violent crimes. This Detention Alternative Placement Program (DAP) option is being made available to you and to all local governmental entities in your county by the Department, in lieu of secure detention, at no cost. We would encourage you to make all public safety or local law enforcement in your jurisdiction aware of this option to secure detention and ask that you encourage their utilization of this "no cost" option, whenever they determine such to be appropriate. Additional information about this option to secure detention can be obtained by contacting your local DJJ County Director or by calling DJJ's state coordinator for this service, Mr. Tom Foley, at (803) 896-9349.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT FOR THE DETENTION OF JUVENILES

THIS AGREEMENT is made this 1 day of July, 2014, by and between the South Carolina Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) by and through its duly authorized employee and the governing body of <u>City of Cayce</u>, hereinafter referred to as <u>City of Cayce</u>, by and through its duly authorized official and/or employee;

WHEREAS, the Juvenile Detention Act of 1990, in compliance with the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974, mandates, in effect, that juveniles who are held in detention be confined in separate and distinct facilities from adults similarly confined; and

WHEREAS, City of Cayce does not operate or manage its own detention facility for juveniles, or otherwise have such a facility available to it for the detention of juveniles; and

WHEREAS, DJJ operates a facility for the detention of juveniles, along with an array of other residential placements for juveniles, who are awaiting their return to another jurisdiction or state, or awaiting their adjudication and/or dispositional hearings in the Family or General Sessions Courts of this State, which have passed all necessary state inspections or approvals, and are suitable for the detention of juveniles; and

WHEREAS, the General Assembly has mandated that "the governing body of the law enforcement agency having original jurisdiction (over) where the offense occurred" be responsible for paying a portion of the costs of the detention services for juveniles provided by DJJ, who are charged with committing crimes within the governing body's jurisdictional limits;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein, it is agreed as follows:

DJJ will admit into its Juvenile Detention Center in Columbia, and detain such juveniles in this Center, subject to its design/operational capacity and any limitations set forth in Section 63-19-830 (A), those juveniles who are charged with committing criminal/status offenses within the jurisdictional limits of the above listed entity and who have been/are:

- 1. qualified to be placed in secure detention (as determined by Section 63-19-820 (B), which the local law enforcement entity wishes to have detained prior to a detention hearing before the Family Court; or
- 2. ordered to be taken into custody and detained by the Family Court or other lawful authority; or

- 3. pending waiver or juveniles (16 and below) who have been waived to the Court of General Sessions to be tried as adults; or
- 4. 16 years old and charged as an adult with committing a Category A-D felony.

Acceptance and retention of detainees in its Juvenile Detention Center will be on a space available basis and will be in accordance with admission and detention criteria established by DJJ. However, <u>City of Cayce</u> agrees to remove any detainees accepted and detained under criteria 4 above, on or within one week after that detainee's 17th birthday.

City of Cayce agrees to assign an open Purchase Order Number \(\text{Number} \), to be effective from July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015.

The per diem rate for detention which is to be paid by "the governing body of the law enforcement agency having original jurisdiction where the offense occurred," is \$50.00 per 24-hour day. (Detention periods of between from 1 to 23 hours shall be charged as a ½ day charge of \$25.). Payments to DJJ are to be made on a monthly basis as the costs accrue.

DJJ agrees to bill <u>City of Cayce</u> on a monthly basis; said bills to be sent on or before the 15th day of the month after the month where the costs are incurred, with payment to be made on or before the first (1st) day of the following month. Additionally, DJJ agrees to periodically provide <u>City of Cayce</u> with a report on <u>City of Cayce</u>'s use of the DJJ Detention Facility. This report will reflect the status of juveniles being detained for periods greater than 30 days.

The "local law enforcement agency having jurisdiction where the offense was committed" shall be responsible for transporting all juveniles to and from DJJ's Juvenile Detention Center. However, a local law enforcement entity may enter into agreements with other local law enforcement agencies or other entities for transporting of a juvenile to and from DJJ's Juvenile Detention Center and the fact that a particular local law enforcement agency or entity transports a juvenile to or from DJJ shall not be determinative as to which law enforcement agency has jurisdiction over the offense committed or necessarily obligate the governing board of the transporting entity to pay for the cost of that juvenile's detention.

In accordance with Act #571 of 1990, relating to Juvenile Detention and consistent with the criteria outlined in DJJ Community Services Policies and Procedures (DJJ Detention Screening Process; Policy Number F-7.0), no juvenile shall be placed in and/or transported to, a DJJ detention facility until law enforcement has notified DJJ and DJJ has conducted a detention screening, or until a Family Court Judge or other judicial official, has determined that placement in secure detention is appropriate.

Copy A - DJJ shall be responsible for transporting juveniles to and from its Juvenile Dentention Center in Columbia and any staff secure or community residence placement to which it assigns a juvenile detainee.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT PAGE 3

<u>City of Cayce</u> shall provide the DJJ Juvenile Detention Center with all relevant information pertaining to the juvenile, including medical history/limitations/pre-existing conditions, known psychological and psychiatric problems, charges pending before the court, and completed screening or detention forms if such records or information are in the possession of, or otherwise known to, the transporting law enforcement agency.

DJJ's Juvenile Detention Center shall have the right to refuse admission when a juvenile is presented for placement without an appropriate detention order signed by the Court or detention referral papers, completed and signed by a DJJ employee or screening agent. DJJ's Juvenile Detention Center shall also have the right to refuse admission when a juvenile is deemed inappropriate by the Center for placement due to psychological/psychiatric problems, age, history, not meeting referral/admissions criteria, indications of alcohol or other drug intoxication, medical condition which requires emergency or immediate medical care or treatment or for any other reason which puts the Center at risk, should such a juvenile be accepted.

DJJ shall not be financially responsible for the cost of medical care provided to a juvenile detained in its juvenile detention center for any injury; illness, condition, or medical need that pre-existed the juvenile's admission to its Detention Center.

Detention services provided by DJJ shall commence upon execution of this contract and terminate, unless this contract is reauthorized and renewed, on July 1, 2015 Either party may cancel this agreement upon thirty (30) days' written notice.

Sums paid or payable under this contract shall not exceed \$\frac{4}{2000}\$. for fiscal year 2014-2015 as determined by both parties. However, if juveniles continue to be presented for secure detention by City of Cayce once the above budgeted amount has been reached, City of Cayce agrees to pay for the cost of any additional detainees as provided for in the paragraph addressing detention rates.

Subject: Approval for the lowest responsible bid for the construction

of Riverwalk Phase IV.

Issue

Council approval is needed to accept the lowest responsible bid for the Riverwalk Phase IV Construction Project and to execute a contract between the City of Cayce and AOS Specialty Contractors

Discussion

Through the PRT Recreational Trails grant, the City has received funds totaling \$100,000 for the Riverwalk Phase IV project. Council previously approved up to \$300,000 in TIF funds to be used in conjunction with this grant for construction.

The Lowest Bidder for Phase IV was Johnson and Lesley at \$239,994. However, after contacting the LLR, staff has found this firm unqualified to do this work. The contractor does not hold a General Contractors license for the majority of the work for this project (concrete and boardwalk construction). The subcontractor they have listed to do the concrete work is not licensed in the state of South Carolina.

The next lowest bidder was AOS Specialty Contractors at \$274,935. Research with the LLR concluded this firm is eligible, has completed work for the City previously, and is in good standing.

Recommendation

Staff recommends City Council give approval to accept the bid from AOS Specialty Contractors, and authorize the City Manager to execute the contract.

I. CALL TO ORDER

Chair Ed Fuson called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm. Members present were Butch Broehm, Larry Mitchell, John Raley, Chris Kueny, Robert Power, and Butch Kelly. Staff present was Shaun Greenwood and Monique Ocean.

II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Mr. Raley made a motion to approve the minutes from April 21, 2014, meeting. Mr. Broehm seconded the motion. The vote passed unanimously.

III. STATEMENT OF NOTIFICATION

Chair Ed Fuson asked if the public and media had been duly notified of the meeting. Monique Ocean confirmed that everyone had been notified.

IV. PUBLIC HEARING – Map Amendment 003-14 [Request for zoning change from PDD to RG-2 for TMS 004652-08-012(portion)]

a. Opening Statement

Mr. Greenwood explained that the request is to change a portion of the subject property, located on Deliesseline Road, from a PDD (Planned Development District) to an RG-2 (General Residential, High Rise) district. Mr. Greenwood mentioned that a survey map of the property in question had been handed out to the Commission. Mr. Greenwood further explained that, after successful rezoning, the subject property will have a split zoning and the re-zoned portion will be combined with the properties fronting on Knox Abbott Drive (hearings for the re-zoning requests (C-3 to RG-2) of the properties fronting on Knox Abbott Drive were held at the April 21, 2014, the Planning Commission meeting). Mr. Fuson requested further clarification as to if the subject property served as the "unofficial" gateway to the Riverwalk Park. Mr. Greenwood confirmed

that it was. Mr. Charles Thompson, representative of the applicant, came forward to state that the subject property would remain as an open space and he wished to come to an agreement with the City to combine the area with the Riverwalk Park trail. Mr. Thompson also explained that the additional property would be used to complete density requirements for a proposed multi-family structure. Mr. Greenwood added, for reference, that the subject property must remain an open space because of a variance request, to exceed the maximum permitted lot coverage ratio in an RG-2 zoned district, previously granted by the Board of Zoning Appeals (BOZA) on April 21, 2014. In order to use this area as anything other than a natural area, another variance would be required or the developer would have to decrease the impervious surface on another part of the development.

b. Public Testimony

Diane Janicki of 115 Deliesseline Road stated that she was not able to attend the last meeting. Ms. Janicki requested confirmation that the subject property would remain an open space and would eventually become a part of the Riverwalk Trail. Mr. Greenwood explained that only Council was at liberty to make the decision of whether the subject property would become a component of the Riverwalk Trail. Mr. Greenwood also stated that the current site plan of the property shows the area in question remaining as a natural area. Mr. Greenwood further explained changes to the site plan or adding more impervious surface would require additional variances.

No one else came forward to speak.

c. Close Hearing

Chair Ed Fuson closed the public hearing.

V. MOTION – Map Amendment 003-14

A motion was made by Mr. Raley to recommend that Council approve the rezoning request for MA003-14. Mr. Kueny seconded the motion. The vote passed unanimously.

VI. OPEN PUBLIC HEARING – Map Amendment 004-14 [Request for zoning change from RG-2 to M-1 for TMS 005740-013-002, 003, & 005]

a. Opening Statement

properties do not conform to zoning, thus, creating legal non-conforming uses. Mr. Greenwood indicated that the legal non-conformity status could be lost if a property were to remain vacant for over six months. Mr. Greenwood mentioned that staff believes the requested re-zoning would be a start in correcting errors on the Zoning Map and that staff had received approval from the owners of the subject properties. Mr. Greenwood also stated that the re-zoning will be in compliance with the Land Use Plan.

- Landscaping and buffer yard requirements will follow regulations of the Zoning Ordinance and regulations of the sellers of the property, and
- 4. The design of the buildings will remain mostly as they appear on

Mr. Ed Fuson was appointed to the Planning Commission in 1998 and is currently the Chairman of the Commission. He regularly attends the Planning Commission meetings and if he is absent it is an excused absence.

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
